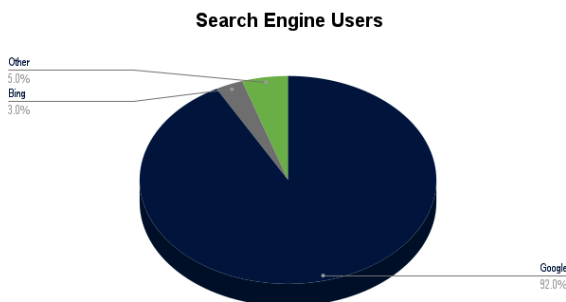

Crawling: How Search Engines Discover Content

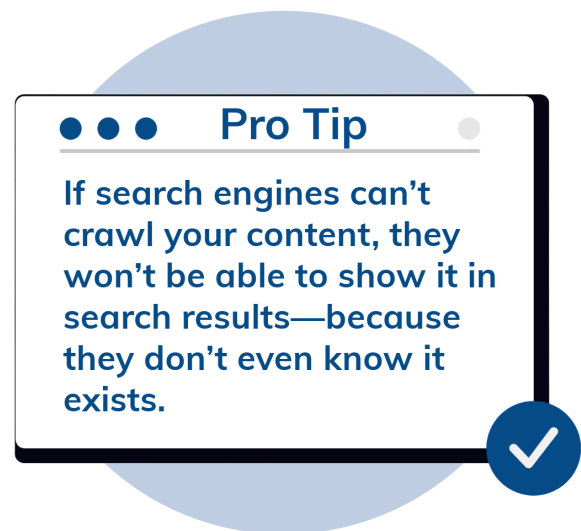

Ranking factors include both **on-page** and **off-page** variables.

When it comes to SEO ranking, **on-page SEO** refers to all the optimizations you make *on your website* to improve its visibility in search engines. This includes things like keyword usage, meta tags, internal linking, header structure, content quality, and technical elements like schema markup. In contrast, **off-page SEO** focuses on factors *outside your website* that influence your rankings, primarily backlinks from other trusted websites, brand mentions, social signals, and local citations. Together, on-page and off-page SEO form a complete strategy that helps search engines understand your content and recognize your site as credible and authoritative. Examples of each of these are listed below:

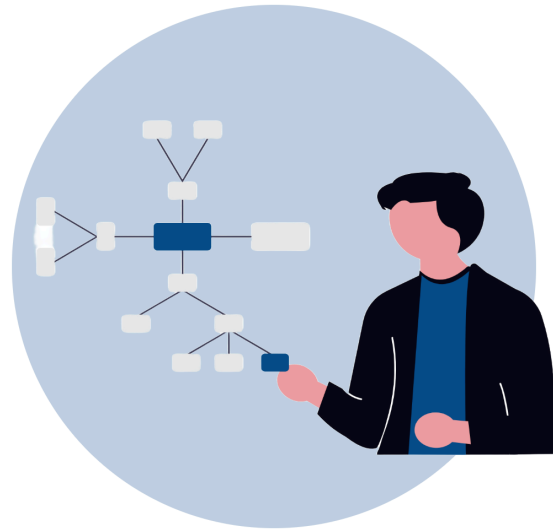

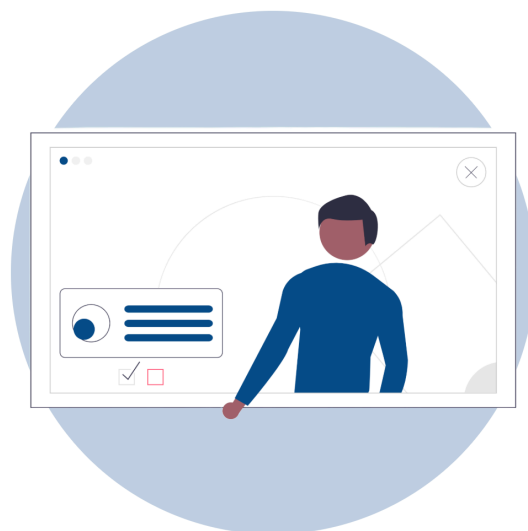
